Core Curriculum

For the first and second semesters, all art students enroll in the same art courses: the Core Curriculum. At the end of the second semester, work is submitted from Core studio courses to the Core Portfolio Review. This review is intended to assess knowledge and skills, and to determine readiness to pursue work in primary studios.

Core Portfolio Review

The Core Curriculum includes 2-D Design, 3-D Design, Color Theory, Representational Drawing, Figure Drawing, Expressive Drawing, Digital Media & Techniques and the Core Portfolio Review. Register for the Core Portfolio Review in the second semester of the freshman year, or the semester when the Core Curriculum will be completed. The Core Portfolio Review is offered for 0 s.h., and is listed as course # ART-02.222. The review is held during the last week of classes, the week before finals week, of each semester, ask your advisor for actual date.

Requirements

All incoming freshman and transfers are required to enroll in the Core Curriculum as explained previously. Sign up for it using the form that is located in the Westby office. Sign up early in the semester because there is a deadline for admission.

A minimum of 15 pieces of artwork ready for presentation, including 8 drawings (objective, expressive and figure drawings with line and tone examples), 5 two-dimensional and 2 three-dimensional design pieces. All work must be clearly labeled with your name, the course in which it was completed, project or assignment, grades received, and date completed.

The evaluation for the Core Portfolio Review will result in either a "Pass—Making satisfactory progress" or "Pass*—Additional assistance is needed" for further progress toward the degree and must see a studio advisor.

Additional information about the Core Portfolio Review is available in the Art Department Office.

Graduation Requirements

To graduate from Rowan University, students must fulfill all requirements for the degree program in which they are enrolled.

Transfer credits will be accepted on a case-by-case basis. A minimum grade of C- is required for all courses taken as part of the Art degree.

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Bachelor of Art in Art

The BA in Art is a liberal arts degree program designed for students who seek a broad education or wish to seek an endorsement in the teaching of art (K-12). All students enter the Art Department as Bachelor of Art students. The BA in Art offers a broad academic education, with study in the fine arts. The program requires 120 semester hours: art (39 s.h.), general education (54 s.h.) and non-program electives (27 s.h.). This distribution of requirements provides the opportunity to study art in

breadth as well as accommodate students who seek certification in art.

The BA in Art degree emphasizes academic studies in liberal arts, as well as art experiences in studio art and art history. Broad study is provided in such areas as literature, language, philosophy, history, and the social sciences. Art study in the BA program allows the study of art without making an early commitment to a specific area of art. If you develop interest in a certain area, you can use the free electives to pursue any subject, including art. Regular

meetings with an academic advisor are required to clarify the many choices available in the BA. Advisors can help select courses and program directions that match interests while ensuring the fulfillment of program requirements.

Art study includes the study of art history and studio art. Studio skills and knowledge will place emphasis on:

- Understanding quality in the making and designing of art works
- Conceptualizing the observation process
- **Mowledge and appreciation of major art works in both Western and non-Western cultures
- **vs** Relating contemporary aesthetic thinking in the visual arts to personal studio work
- Critical-thinking ability and communication skills

- Developing basic competencies in one studio area

After successfully completing the Core Portfolio Review, diverse areas of study may be considered within the University as well as exploring interests in art. The BA general education requirement allows for 14 semester hours of electives in general education, and for 27 semester hours of free electives. Ultimately, this balance provides a broad academic education, allowing the pursuit of various career options, including the fine arts, media arts, commercial arts, or entrepreneurial endeavors. The BA in Art also prepares students for graduate studies in art-related fields and related studies. Generally, eight semesters are required to finish the BA program.

Each semester, all students are required to receive academic guid-

ance in selecting courses, exploring curricular options, ensuring that program requirements are being met. Meeting times with your academic and studio advisors will be posted in Westby Hall. In addition, advisors are available for discussion and guidance at any time about any concern. If they don't have a solution, they may be able to identify helpful resources.

The BA student is expected to complete either a Senior Thesis Exhibition or a Senior Project during the final semester of the program. The Senior Thesis Exhibition requires completing the Work in Progress Review at least one semester before intended graduation and the Senior Thesis Exhibition. Before the senior year, plans must be made with academic advisors and studio advisors for the exhibition to ensure sufficient preparation and development of studio competencies.

If the Senior Research Project is chosen, a written philosophical or

research objective is required. This objective must be decided on with your studio advisor and two other members of the faculty. A project proposal must be presented and approved at the beginning of the semester in which the project will be completed.

Bachelor of Fine Art in Studio Art

The BFA in Studio Art is a professional, studio-intensive degree program for students who wish to become illustrators, designers or fine artists. The standards are high, the work is demanding, and the rewards are great. For graphic design and illustra-

tion students, the BFA is intended to provide the experience and knowledge necessary to construct a professional portfolio for employment. For the fine art student, the BFA is intended to provide the knowledge and experience necessary to develop a body of work for acceptance into graduate school or for work as a professional artist.

The BFA in Art degree requires 120 semester hours: art major (78 s.h.), general education (42 s.h.). There are restricted electives in art, art electives, distributive studio and support courses and other art history requirements.

To enter the BFA in Art, work must be submitted to the BFA Application Review after successfully completing the Core Portfolio Review and a minimum of three major studios. A 3.0 GPA is required in art major classes to apply for the BFA.

Ultimately, it is the quality of the portfolio (or body of work) that will

determine opportunities for the graphic designer, illustrator, or fine artist.

Studio skills and knowledge will include:

- Understanding the principles and language of art and design
- **vs** Developing aesthetic solutions to design problems
- **vs** Synthesizing drawing, design and image-making to a complete and professional level
- cs Demonstrating proficiency in the use of materials, equipment, techniques and processes and working from the original conception to the finished product
- Writing and talking about conceptual issues in art
- **cs** Exploring the expressive possibilities of a variety of media, including non-traditional and experimental imagery
- broad personal expression

The Sequence for the BFA in Studio Art

The BFA Application Review generally takes place in the fourth semester, or the second semester of the sophomore year. A complete application will include work from two major studio courses, at least six pieces that demonstrate aesthetic and technical achievement. All work must be presentation ready. See your advisor for assistance.

After completing three semesters of course work in the chosen primary studio, work will be submitted for the Work in Progress Review. This review is followed by the Senior Thesis Exhibition. (Successful completion of the Work In Progress is required for the Senior Thesis Exhibition). At the time of the Work in Progress Review, 4-6 pieces must be submitted for adjudication and inclusion in an exhibition of all Work in Progress Review candidates.

At the end of the senior or fourth

vear, and before walking at commencement, all BFA in Studio Art students must complete a Senior Thesis Exhibition. Three (full-time) faculty members must be chosen. including the primary studio advisor, to jury the exhibition. A Statement of Intent will be given to the faculty jury one semester before the Senior Thesis Exhibition will take place. The statement should be a minimum of two typed pages and should describe and explain the work. You must be able to address such items as imagery, technique, and future plans in the statement. One month before the exhibition, your work is presented to the primary advisor for approval. One week prior to the official opening of the exhibition, a copy of the Thesis Statement is given to each member of the experienced exhibition jury.

For more information on the Senior Thesis Exhibition, talk to your advisor.

The Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art Specialization in Graphic Design (BFA)

A professional, studio-intensive, BFA specialization for students who wish to become graphic designers. The graphic design industry is highly competitive and broad ranging. This specialization allows Rowan University students who wish to enter the graphic design field the added advantage of demonstrating to potential employers that they have followed a sequential course of study. The curriculum consists of the seven graphic design courses offered by the Art Department and fulfills the graphic design specialization requirements. This BFA specialization provides a comprehensive education for students who are interested in entering the graphic design profession.

B.A. in Art/B.A. in Education/Endorsement in the Teaching of Art (K-12)

This dual-major program offers students an opportunity to satisfy degree requirements for a BA in Art and a BA in Education with New Jersey State Art Teacher Endorsement for grades K-12. With artistic studies in art history and studio, the program combines the broad perspectives of a liberal arts education with a focus on educational theories and methodologies. Information about this program can be obtained from the Art Department (856) 256-4010. For Post-Baccalaureate endorsement in the teaching of art K-12, obtain information from The Graduate School (856) 256-4050.

Students must first gain acceptance to the University and the Art Department by passing a portfolio entrance interview. Students interested in obtaining teaching endorsement can declare art certification as a preference for study.

Coursework in the teaching endorsement program begins in the freshman year where introductory level courses focus on the theoretical underpinnings and practical applications of teaching in the public school system. In the sophomore vear students learn to create learning communities in the art classroom and examine the field of art education and the role of the arts specialist from an historical perspective through present day issues. In the junior year, art teaching methods courses are designed to build upon the learner's understanding of a wide range of topics in the field of art education. Practically, students learn how to prepare lesson and unit plans, design art curriculum and develop strategies for the art classroom.

Hands-on training is provided through field placements in the public schools where students observe and assist veteran art teachers prior to student teaching.

In the final semester, students are assigned to an art classroom in a nearby public school. As student teachers they assume full responsibility for art instruction, classroom management and other school duties under the guidance of the cooperating art teacher. A clinical supervisor from the Art Department oversees each student's experiences in the field. The student is placed for the first eight weeks in an elementary or middle school and is moved to a middle or secondary school setting for the remaining eight weeks of the semester. Students also participate in seminars focusing on their own type of clinical practice experiences.

To be admitted to clinical practice (student teaching), students must maintain a "B" average 3.0/ GPA in their required major and professional education courses with a 2.5 cumulative GPA. Students will not be assigned to clinical practice with

grades of "D", "F", or "incomplete" on their transcripts.

Successful completion of two teacher's exams, the Praxis I (General Knowledge) and Praxis II (Art Specialty Content) are required. Praxis I must be completed prior to registering for the courses Teaching and Learning A: Art and Teaching and Learning B: Art. Praxis II must be taken one semester prior to clinical practice. Please see your advisor if you have questions or concerns.

Minor in Art

The Minor in Art is open to any interested Rowan Student. A portfolio review is required to enter the program. Transfer students are required to take a minimum of 15 credit hours toward the minor at Rowan.

The Minor in Art consists of 24 semester hours: seven core courses (Core Curriculum and Art Appreciation).

Students interested in the Minor in

Art should contact the Art Department office, and schedule a portfolio review. Information on the requirements for a portfolio review is available from the Art Department office at Westby.

Minor in Art History

The Minor in Art History is open to any interested Rowan student. Transfer students are required to take a minimum of twelve credit hours toward the minor at Rowan University.

A student may earn a Minor in Art History in addition to fulfilling the requirements for his or her undergraduate degree. To qualify for a Minor in Art History, a student must complete a minimum of eighteen (18) semester hours designated for the minor. A minimum grade of C- is required for all courses taken as part of the minor. Students may register for the minor at any point prior to completing the Bachelors degree, but are encouraged to do this as early as possible.

Study Abroad

Many students at Rowan University choose to study abroad for either all or part of an academic year. The Art Department strongly encourages participation in the study abroad experience. The Art Department is privileged to be able to offer the Seward Johnson Artist Development Travel Scholarship for one student to study for each spring semester at the Studio Art Centers International (SACI) in Florence, Italy. Rowan is a member of the SACI consortium.

Seward Johnson: Artist Development Travel Scholarship

Minimum Eligibility: To compete for the Seward Johnson Artist Development Travel Scholarship, a candidate must:

- **Be a current full-time undergraduate art major at Rowan University with at least 60 credits (by the end of the fall semester);
- **Mave completed Art History Surveys I, II, and III (with at least a minimum grade of B in each art history course) by the end of the fall semester;
- 4.0 scale at the time of application. This includes grades from all institutions of higher learning, not just those earned at Rowan University.

Deadline: All materials must be submitted to the art department office (see Susan Chard, secretary) no later than noon on **September 19, 2007**. For questions, please contact vaccaro@rowan.edu.

Academic Advising

Academic advising usually takes place in the second month of the semester. For example, advising for spring semester 2008 will take place during October 2007; advising for fall semester 2008 will take place during the first half of March 2008. All students are expected to schedule a meeting with their academic advisor in the Art Department office. A list of meeting times will be posted on the desk in the front office. When you meet with your advisor, you should have reviewed the schedule for the upcoming semester, and be ready to request specific classes

necessary to fulfill the requirements for your degree. Attached are copies of the advisement sheets for each degree track with a list of the classes required for you to complete successfully your degree. You should keep your own record of classes that you have taken and the grades received for each class. Any future change in degree requirements will not affect your degree program.

Primary Studio Advising

Every student enrolled in a degree program in the Art Department must choose a primary studio. Students who pursue a BA or BA with endorsement to teach (K-12) must enroll in a minimum of 10.5 studio credits beyond the core. Students who pursue a BFA or BFA with endorsement to teach (K-12) must enroll in a primary studio for at least four semesters.

The full-time faculty in your primary studio will act as your advisor.

You should consult with your primary studio advisor regarding the BFA application, the Work in Progress Review, the Senior Thesis Exhibition, submitting work for the annual juried student exhibition, and enrolling in elective classes. Your primary studio advisor may also be consulted about personal or academic problems with which you may be dealing on or off campus and will assist you so you may contact the appropriate sources to help resolve any difficulties.

LESSON #1 The Mysterious RowanCard

OK, so go get yourself a RowanCard. You need one for proof of I.D. any way, so why not talk your parents into depositing some cash on the card. (Beg if necessary!)

Students can draw upon two accounts when using the Rowan-Card—the Meal Plan/Dining Dollars account and the Debit Dollars/Debit account. Please be aware that Dinning Dollars can only be used for food purchases on-campus or pizza and Chinese locations off-campus. Debit Dollars can be used at any food location as well as any other purchase wherever and whenever the RowanCard is accepted.

To open either account, visit the Bursar's Office in Savitz Hall, ground level. Once the account is open, students can continue to deposit money in person or on-line through student services.

How do you open your own debit account? Every person who is issued a RowanCard also has the option of using his or her RowanCard Debit Account. There is no need to "open" this account, simply make a deposit at the Rowan web site and then use your card at any of the participating merchants.

LESSON #4 Getting Money from Rowan University



Art supplies are extremely expensive. If you do not know this, you will realize it at Rowan University. Because of this, it's important that you know about all the ways to squeeze money from Rowan.

Grants

There are two types of grants: internal and external. Both can be found at the Office for Government Grants or at their web site.

Scholarships and Financial Aid

There you can apply for Financial

Aid. Forms are found at that online web site or you can go to Savitz Hall on the first Floor. Or you call them at 856-256-4250 or fax them at 856-256-4413.

If you are specifically looking for scholarship information you can go to http://www.rowan.edu/studentaffairs/financialaid/scholarships/. There you can select open scholarships by your major (or your minor). This is updated frequently so don't be discouraged if there doesn't seem to be anything available right away. Also, talk to your advisor and your professors for additional opportunities.

Freelancing Art Work

OK, so it's not exactly *free* money, but it's money that you previously didn't have before. No matter what your discipline is, there are plenty of opportunities on and off campus to practice your craft, gain experience, work with people, build your portfolio, and

most times, get money for doing so.

There are two ways that really work. Ask your advisor. We know we have repeated this time after time in this booklet, but we truly mean it. Get to know your professors, advisors, student body. This is called networking. This is going to be the make or break in your career. It's not just about your portfolio and the skills that you are sure to attain here at Rowan; it's also about your people skills and ability to get yourself out there. Clients need to know you exist before they can give you work. Ask your student body if there's anyone who needs work done. You never know, one job could lead to another, then who knows. If nothing else, you'll still have a great portfolio piece to show your next client.

The second way to make extra money is to scour the Internet. Pull up Rowan's web site. There are plenty of departments that need work done. The theater department probably needs props made or scenery painted. Maybe the marketing department needs flyers made. Music department might need some posters. Science department might need some illustrations made. Maybe a department needs a revamp on their web site. Who knows. Contact them, let them know you exist and want to help! You need the experience, the portfolio piece, and most departments will give you an honorary monetary sum! (YAY MONEY!)

You can also go through external companies that are supported by Rowan at http://www.rowan.edu/studentaffairs/cap/internship/all_majors.htm. This tends to be the more tedious way to go, but if you know exactly what type of job you are looking for, this is probably the next method. Try not to get overwhelmed by the selection. You'll find what you're looking for, some of the sites are better than others, if you can't find it quickly, just try another site from the list.
